Based on 35 years of personal and professional experiences in developing open-ended play, I provide through regular instagram sharings, ideas and insights of how simple, everyday materials and other resources, can richly support every child's development.

While children engage in playful learning, a dedicated team works behind the scenes to make it possible. A key member of this team is Grant Tan, an NTU full-time student who, alongside Playeum staff member, Alisa and Lik Qi, are dedicated to manage programme logistics, volunteer coordination and child interactions. The team also prepares session materials, manage registration details, and oversees photo documentation. Beyond his logistical duties, Grant is frequently praised by parents and children alike for his remarkable, child-centered facilitation skills. When asked what draws him to the programme, Grant explained: Over my (short) year with OMOD, I've come to learn a lot from the programme, not just from Dr. Esther and the incredible team that I've managed to work with, but also through my experiences with every single child and family that has joined us.

Coming from a background of working in other forms of support for special needs, I appreciate the unique philosophy present in OMOD, which is always child-led and child-first. Drawing on this, play is also a process of exploring, and therefore it is imperative that we be gracious to ourselves in the face of the challenges and difficulties that we encounter. As we come into our seventh year of OMOD, I have no doubt that it will continue to be such a space for all of us: one for not just celebrating the successes that we see, but also a safe space to try new things, and appreciate the journey along the way..."

The Global Challenge of Inclusive Play and Our Response through OMOD

Open Minds Open Doors started with the core vision: To Create Pathways through Play to an Inclusive World. Now in its seventh year, we are strengthening our outreach through family play education and guidance. Let's briefly explain "Why Play" play leads to growth, inclusion and development.

One reason for us to advocate play is that children learn the social relationships needed to grow in the community and the future workplace. Unfortunately, most play practices in Singapore, and around the world, remain non-inclusive. A primary barrier is that design philosophies often pay little attention to the essential social and communicative aspects of play or accessable materials. There is usually insufficient attention paid to designing opportunities or to developing the social and communication skills necessary for all children to participate.

Recent data from the Netherlands, a nation celebrated for its commitment to children's play and inclusion, shows that more than one in three children with a disability never visits a local playground. Among those who do, over a quarter frequently play alone. Furthermore, 72% of children without a disability never arrange playdates with a peer who has a disability. These statistics are not just numbers from a specific country; they are a global call to action that fuels Open Minds Open Doors.

During OMOD, we witness firsthand the transformative power of intentionally designed play. We aim to continuously raise families' awareness of the value of OMOD and play. During each session, we:

- Ensure every family and child is a valued participant and is listened to.
- Document the effect of play on regularly participating children, and share ideas with parents to understand progress and 21st-century skills.
- Develop insights that although play is not a magic potion, most children, regardless of ability, can experience engagement and growth in their skills or confidence during most sessions.
- Provide tips and resources to committed family members to develop further insights and understanding of open-ended materials play and ideas to create home play spaces that are intentionally designed and accessible, engaging, and meaningful for children of all abilities.

In short, play develops communicative skills and executive functions to let children navigate the social world. As these skills take time, but in OMOD we are committed to create opportunities for play dates to build friendships, and play skills for children to be included and engage with peers through play and in the community.
